Dear Friends,

This past year at OHRA has been one of growth, transition, and renewed purpose. Together, we've shown what it means to step up as a community and lead with compassion and determination.

One of the most significant milestones was the leadership transition at OHRA. After years of dedicated service, Cass Sinclair stepped down as Executive Director, and I was honored to join this incredible team and lead OHRA into its next chapter. I'm grateful for the strong foundation she built and inspired by the dedication of our staff, volunteers, and supporters.

We are proud of what we accomplished together in 2024–2025. OHRA continues to serve as a leader in addressing the challenges of those who are unhoused and housing insecure in Southern Oregon. We don't just respond to immediate needs — we forge partnerships, create innovative solutions, and inspire others to join us in building a stronger, more caring community.

These successes came despite significant challenges. Over the past year, we faced dramatic funding cuts from the state and reductions to Medicaid – painful reminders of how vulnerable this work can be to external forces. We responded by doubling down on what we can control: diversifying our income streams, strengthening our relationships with donors and partners, and exploring new ways to sustain our mission for the long term.

Looking ahead, we will build on these successes and continue to innovate – expanding our programs, deepening partnerships, and advocating for the systemic changes necessary to address the root causes of homelessness. Together, we can create a community where everyone has the support they need to find stability.

Thank you for standing with us – your partnership makes this work possible.

OHRA's Resource Center



At the heart of OHRA is our Resource Center. Nearly half of our funding supports its vital work, where community members in crisis meet with trained Navigators to access the tools and supports they need to meet their basic needs. By stepping in and helping families, seniors, and individuals before a crisis deepens, the Resource Center at OHRA prevents homelessness and instability before it begins.



OHRA Core Values

OHRA through the years

A foundation of partnerships

2013

- OHRA & ACCESS jointly awarded 100k startup funds for a **Homeless Resource Center** to provide direct services in Ashland.

Focus on stability

2016–2018

- OHRA begins operating **independent** of ACCESS.
- Resource Center **relocates** to a more accessible location & focuses on **moving people from crisis to stability**.
- In response to a request from the City & in partnership with faith organizations & volunteers, OHRA agrees to managing the **Ashland Winter Shelter** program.

Crisis response

2020

- OHRA again partners with **ACCESS** & distributes nearly \$1.5M federal **COVID 19** Relief Funds.
- The **Almeda Fire** destroys homes and businesses, leaving many in our community in economic and mental anguish. OHRA sees up to 90 people a day at its Resource Center, up from 25 a day in 2019.

Vision to reality

2022

- Resource Center **relocates** to The OHRA Center
- **Phase I remodeling is completed**, creating:
 - an **ADA accessible shelter** with capacity for up to **72** guests;
 - a **larger Resource Center** with space for staff, volunteers and partner agencies to offer services to to anyone in need, housed or homeless; and
 - a **permanent home** for the **Laundry/Shower Trailer**.

Pivots & progress

2024

- OHRA co-sponsors **Southern Oregon Homelessness Summit** to stimulate community dialog.
- **Kitchen** construction begins thanks to the **City of Ashland**, **Jackson Care Connect** & generous **donor** support.
- OHRA welcomes current **Executive Director Dan Cano**.
- New funding provides **sheltering for families** at a local motel.

2010–2012

Grassroots beginnings

- A small group of concerned citizens begin meeting monthly to discuss **homelessness in our community** and create the 501 c3 "**OHRA**".

2014–2015

Establishing a resource center

- Ashland Community Resource Center established as first permanently placed resource center; OHRA hires our first **program director & resource navigator**, & creates a **community Advisory Council**.
- First community **Laundry/Shower trailer** purchased by OHRA with grant dollars starts operating.

2019

A new direction

- OHRA hires its first **Executive Director** & expands it's staff to facilitate operating a **single site** for the Ashland Winter Shelter, continuing its partnership with dedicated volunteers & faith-based communities.

2021

Breaking new ground

- OHRA awarded the first **Project Turnkey** grant of \$4.2 million in state funds from **Oregon Community Foundation (OCF)** to purchase an Ashland motel and transform it into **The OHRA Center**.
- The OHRA Center Shelter **opens, 7 days a week, 365 days a year** with services to help guests achieve stability.
- Remodeling The OHRA Center begins, thanks to grants from the **MJ Murdock Trust**, **Project Turnkey**, the **Carrico Foundation**, the **City of Ashland** & the services of **local architects & construction professionals**.

2023

On-site partners grow

- **La Clinica** opens an on-site **federally qualified health center**.
- Over **15 partners** start providing on-site services.

2025

Stronger foundations

- **Kitchen** completed & starts serving 1 hot meal /day & to go meals for those in need.
- **Miriam's Cafe** opens, creating a **community space** for dining, events & meetings.
- **Outreach** expands to key sites in the community, including coordination of the Ashland Night Lawn.
- 2nd, **ADA accessible**, Laundry/Shower trailer purchased & goes online.

Finding Hope and Dignity at OHRA: Erik's Story

When life unraveled for Erik Swagerty, OHRA was there to help him begin again. For more than a decade, Erik devoted himself to caring for his grandmother and then his father as they faced illness and decline. That love and commitment came at a cost: years of caregiving left him penniless, isolated, and emotionally exhausted.

When his father passed away, Erik had no savings and no safety net. He moved in with a friend, grateful for a place to land, but when his friend's mother returned home needing care, Erik was once again without housing.

For the next several years, he moved around the country with his beloved dog Maya, searching for community and picking up odd jobs. "I've been traveling for a long time," Erik said. "But I was just getting too old for it. I needed a place where I could get back on my feet."

That moment came when Erik found himself in crisis in Southern Oregon. He turned to OHRA—and everything began to change. For six months, Erik lived in OHRA's shelter, where he found stability, privacy, and dignity after years of uncertainty. "I think OHRA is one of the kindest things to ever happen to me," he said. "All I'd been wanting for so long was a place to dig myself out of the hole I was in."

At OHRA, Erik received more than shelter. He was given the space to rest and rebuild, support in finding work, and guidance in securing permanent housing. Importantly, Maya was welcomed too.



Today, Erik has an apartment of his own and steady income. He is saving toward trucking school, a career that suits his adventurous spirit, and is even dreaming of returning to his music.

For Erik, OHRA was the turning point. After years of sacrifice and hardship, OHRA gave him not only a home but hope for a brighter future.

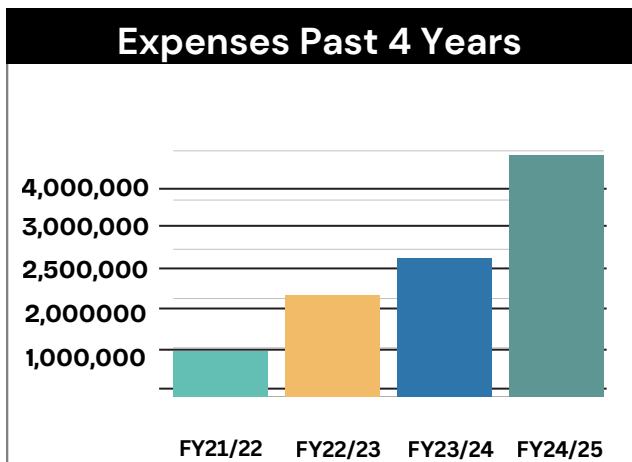

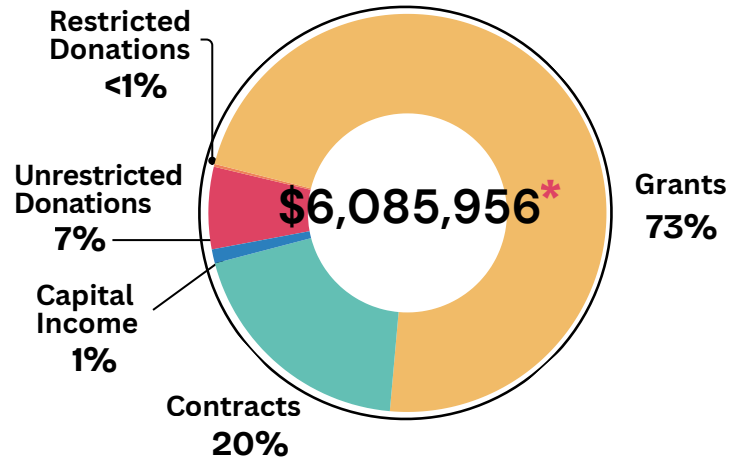
FY 24/25 Financial Snapshot



Year after year, OHRA adapts to meet the evolving needs of our community. Over the past year, the greatest demand we saw was for rental assistance—helping individuals and families stay in their homes and avoid the trauma of homelessness. In response, OHRA secured new funding sources that allowed us to keep hundreds of people housed. These prevention efforts accounted for 66% of our total expenses, underscoring both the urgency of the need and our commitment to addressing it in the years ahead.

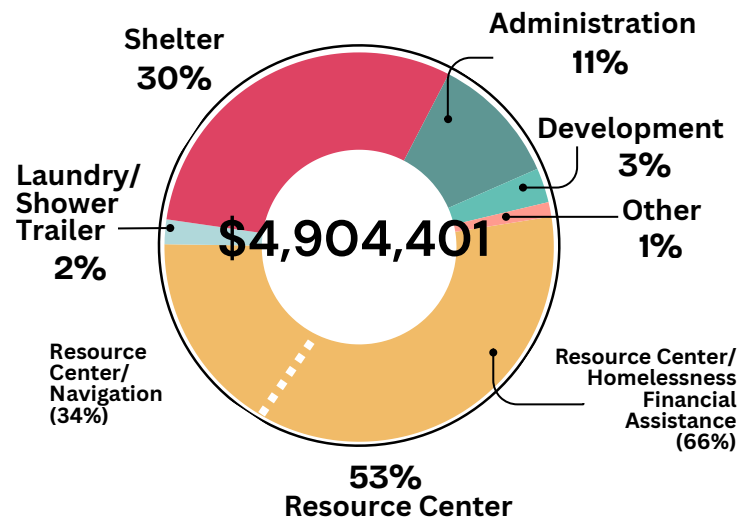


Revenue
